TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN


This will confirm that the University of Virginia, a public research university in Charlottesville, VA, has been based in its current location since it was conceived and designed by President Thomas Jefferson, and established in 1819. It stands on land purchased in 1788 by James Monroe.

The University is a World Heritage Site, one of only three modern sites so listed in the 50 states.

Jefferson's original architectural design revolves around the "Academical Village", and that name remains in use today to describe both the specific area of The Lawn, a grand, terraced green space surrounded by residential and academic buildings, the gardens, The Range, and the larger University surrounding it. The principal building of the design, The Rotunda, stands at the north end of the Lawn, and is the most recognizable symbol of the University.

I personally have been employed by the University since 1992, and prior to that attended the University of Virginia School of Law. Hence I can confirm of my own knowledge that it has been situated in the same location for that period, as well as during the many years before.
