Dear Ms. Dortch:

On behalf of Kuskokwim Public Broadcasting Corporation, we hereby notify you that its four satellite FM radio stations listed above are currently rebroadcasting the signal of the its noncommercial educational Station KSKO-FM, McGrath, Alaska. Those stations were licensed with waivers to operate from the main studio of the licensee's former Station KSKO(AM), McGrath, in order to provide service to small, isolated Alaska native villages. The licensee operated KSKO(AM) for many years, but in 2015 it put KSKO-FM, McGrath on the air and surrendered the license for the AM station, which was exorbitantly expensive to operate. The satellite stations now rebroadcast the FM signal, originated by the same licensee and with the same program service as before the change in parent station. We ask that you reissue the station licenses or make other appropriate note of the change in main station from KSKO to KSKO-FM.

The licensee will, so long as the main studio rule is in effect, continue to comply with the commitments it made in the construction permit applications for the village stations in support of the original main studio waiver showings. Those commitments are (1) to regularly seek out and address issues of public concern within the coverage areas, (2) to make a toll-free telephone number available to the residents of the villages and publicize those numbers there, (3) members of the station's governing board contact community leaders in the villages by telephone, letter, or email on a quarterly basis to solicit their views regarding community issues of public concern warranting responsive programming

and the results of these ascertainment efforts will be reflected in programming aired on the station, and (4) the public files will be maintained in accordance with the rules with reasonable accommodation for listeners wishing to examine the files' contents as required by the rules.
