

Supplement to 2020 EEO Public Inspection File Report
(covering the period February 1, 2020 through January 31, 2021)

Pursuant to a request of the FCC, we are supplementing the EEO Public File Report uploaded on January 27, 2021 with the following information:

In 2020, we attended the following job fairs:

- 2020 - Kansas State University AQ Miller School of Journalism Career Fair 2/27/20
- 2020 MBC Open interview Job Fair - appts made through indeed, interviews held Monday 1/20 through Friday 1/24, open interviews for part time opportunities and station tours.
- We had planned to attend the 2020 Kansas Association of Broadcasters Student Career Fair but it was cancelled due to COVID

In 2020, we began one internship in March 2020 with a student from Kansas State University, but had to end that internship because of COVID as Kansas State did not return for in-person classes after its Spring Break. Thereafter, no interns could be accommodated in our building for the remainder of 2020 because of COVID concerns. The student who was in the internship program in March 2020 is completing that internship in the summer of 2021.
