

FCC Violations Certification

The Commission released a Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture on September 21, 2022 indicating that certain broadcast licensees (including the applicant) apparently failed to comply with the limits on commercial matter in children's programming in specific episodes of a network program aired in late 2018. *See* Cunningham Broadcasting Corporation, et al., Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture, FCC 22-70 (rel. Sept. 21, 2022).

On November 8, 2019, the Media Bureau released a Memorandum Opinion and Order that addressed a good faith negotiations complaint filed against several broadcast licensees, including the Applicant, and found that the licensees violated the good faith negotiation standards raised in the complaint. *See DIRECTV, LLC; AT&T Services, Inc.*, Mem. Op. & Order, MB Docket No. 19-168, 34 FCC Rcd 10367 (MB 2019). A Notice of Apparent Liability was issued on September 15, 2020. *DIRECTV, LLC; AT&T Services, Inc.*, Mem. Op. & Order, MB Docket No. 19-168, FCC 20-122 (2020). On March 14, 2022, the Commission released a Memorandum Opinion and Order and Order on Reconsideration reaffirming the Bureau's decision. *DIRECTV, LLC; AT&T Services, Inc.*, Mem.
