EDUCATIONAL STATEMENT

St. Augustine's University Foundation shall service the residents of Flint through programming on literacy, healthcare, civics, sciences environment, socioeconomics, financial literacy, children and childhood educational development, programs and opportunities, vocational education and programming on liberal arts and sciences that may not necessarily be available to the community otherwise with the aim of raising social consciousness, activism in the community, and participation in social causes and local community needs. We plan on live and pre-produced radio broadcasts that will concern issues unique to Flint. This will be through programming involving conversations and discussions on issues and topics not covered by existing commercial or collegiate FM Radio stations. We also are a source and resource of information related to the educational needs of the community wherever they may be.

ST. AUGUSTINE'S UNIVERSITY & THE FLINT COMMUNITY

St. Augustine's University Foundation is a not-for-profit educational organization that operates Schools, colleges, trade schools, and institutes for academic and vocational education in the State of Michigan and worldwide both in-person and online. The University St. Augustines is a nonprofit, faith-based corporation registered with the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs (DCRA) in Washington DC, aligning with moral integrity, justice, equity, civil rights, humanitarianism, and compliance with prevailing laws. In 1981, President Ronald Reagan authenticated an executive order recognizing MeHarry College, LLC (a predecessor educational organization) as a Historically Black College and University. Meharry College was later renamed University St. Augustine's in 1989. The mission is to provide quality academic education to K-12 Black American students, mitigate the impact of generational illiteracy resulting from slavery, and offer access to quality academic opportunities post-high school for students residing in Michigan and across the nation. The Governance of the USA recognizes its Humanitarian obligation is committed to the elimination of prevailing affirmative action injustices and provides

an inclusive quality academic education for students of all cultures. The Foundation oversees a number of colleges, institutes, trade schools and K-12 programs (including the Early College Preparatory Institute, Dual Enrollment and Advanced Placement) throughout the State of Michigan, including Flint. In furtherance of its educational purpose, it holds Institutional Accreditations.

St. Augustine's University Foundation has been involved in the community of Flint, Michigan through its overall mission of providing educational programs, classes, and resources. As of the 2020 U.S. Census, there were 81,252 people living in Flint. Approximately 55.74% identifying themselves as Black or African American, a community traditionally served by St. Augustine's University Foundation. This mission has become more important in recent years. In the wake of the 2014 contamination of Flint's water source causing lead poisoning to its residents, St. Augustine's University has encountered through its programs and schools an increase in both behavioral and educational disabilities in the youth of Flint. Also impacting Flint is educational opportunities and alternative vocational careers and the need for greater educational opportunities for socioeconomic improvement. Through low-power FM broadcasting, St. Augustine's University Foundation we'll bring to the community information and education on the issues impacting the residents of Flint.

Weekly Programs and Events:

- Oncology education for patients and caregivers on new diagnoses, prescribed treatment regimens, side effects, and instruction on managing side effects to improve treatment compliance and promote positive health outcomes.
- Health education and promotion in the community setting to improve public health. Address various public health issues such as vaccinations, “Mental Wealth “ wellness, and healthy lifestyle modifications.
