Letter of Inquiry

Dear Counsel:

This letter concerns the operational status of Station KZAM(FM), Pleasant Valley, Texas (Station), licensed to Mekaddesh Group Corporation (Mekaddesh). We have before us the above-reference application for an auxiliary FM antenna for the Station (Auxiliary Application). On July 7, 2020, Matinee Media Corporation (Matinee) filed a petition to deny the Auxiliary Application (Petition to Deny).¹ Because the record raises issues regarding the station's operating status during 2020 and 2021, Mekaddesh is required to provide the additional information listed below in writing within thirty days of the date of this letter.

Mekaddesh has been the Station licensee since August 21, 2017.² The currently licensed Station main antenna is located on a tower (ASRN 1262203) owned by Matinee, in Burkburnett, Texas. On February 19, 2020, Mekaddesh submitted a request for silent STA (Silent STA Request), stating that the Station had been off air since February 17, 2020, "due to lack of access to [the] tower site."³ On June 8, 2020, Mekaddesh filed the Auxiliary Application, seeking to construct a new auxiliary antenna for the Station on top of a building in downtown Wichita Falls, Texas, about 13 miles southeast from the Station's licensed site. On July 7, 2020, Matinee filed the Petition to Deny the Auxiliary Application, claiming, *inter alia*, that Mekaddesh had no main facility for the Station and therefore should not be authorized an auxiliary facility. On September 22, 2020, Mekaddesh filed a request for an extension of the Silent STA authorization, explaining that it still lacked access to its transmitter site and was "in

negotiations for acquisition of a new transmitter site.”⁴ On February 11, 2021, Mekaddesh filed a notice of resumption of operations, stating that it had returned to the air on February 10, 2021, using its licensed facilities.⁵

In the Petition to Deny, Matinee states that “Mekaddesh no longer has any legal right to use the Tower” after January 22, 2020, due to Mekaddesh’s failure to pay its monthly fees under a tower license agreement.⁶ Matinee further alleges that Mekaddesh owes Matinee back payments of “over \$30,000” as of February 29, 2020.⁷ Matinee urges that Mekaddesh should not be authorized to operate an auxiliary antenna “for an indefinite or permanent period of time when an FM station did not have an authorized main facility it could use.”⁸ Matinee notes that the proposed auxiliary facilities would not provide signal coverage to the Station’s community of license as required by section 73.315 of the rules⁹ and contends that an auxiliary antenna should be authorized only “when the main antenna is out of service for repair or replacement,” not—as here—where the main facility may not be used at all.¹⁰

Based on the information in the record, it appears that the Station may have been silent (or failed to operate with authorized facilities) for more than one year. Therefore—before we reach the issue of whether a licensee may construct an auxiliary facility for a station that lacks a main facility—we must determine whether the Station’s license has automatically expired under section 312(g) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended (Section 312(g)).¹¹ Section 312(g) provides that if a broadcast station fails to transmit broadcast signals *with its authorized facilities* for any consecutive 12-month period, then the station license granted for the operation of that broadcast station expires at the end of that period, notwithstanding any provision, term, or condition of the license to the contrary, except that the Commission may extend or reinstate such station license to promote equity and fairness.¹²

We direct Mekaddesh to submit complete information describing the Station's operational status and history as follows. Please provide evidence documenting the Station's operational status for **all periods of operation** from January 1, 2020, to the present. This evidence must indicate the exact location (ASRN or geographic coordinates) of the Station's transmitter and antenna, including the effective radiated power and antenna height above ground level. Also include copies of all leases, other contracts relating to the operation of the station (such as equipment rentals, utility bills, service contracts, etc.), personnel records (including payroll records appropriately redacted to protect the privacy of individual employees), engineering records, and station records, including EAS logs, and all correspondence (including emails and text messages) relating to the Station for that period of time. In addition, you must provide copies of all invoices, bills, checks written or received, credit card charges, wire transfers or deposits of funds relating to the Station's operation.¹³ You should also include photographs of the Station's studio facilities and transmission facilities during this timeframe.

Please be aware that any failure to respond to this letter or to provide all the requested information may result in automatic cancellation of the Station's license pursuant to section 312(g), as well as potential financial forfeiture penalties for any associated rule violations.
