Additionally the FCC links in the public file to Children's Television Programming Reports for the period October 2014 through December 2015 did not function. So WXCW uploaded the reports to the public file.

With respect to political matters, the station implemented most elements of the compliance plan in the Consent Decree attached to <u>Order</u>, DA 20-871, released August 12, 2020. The station is confident that since the date of implementation, required political information has been placed in the political file in a timely fashion. The licensee has not, however, completed its review of political files created prior to implementation of the compliance plan and will supplement this exhibit with the results of that review.

WXCW did not discover any other public file deficiencies in its review.

To remedy its public inspection file problems, the station has designated a single individual as the person responsible to the general manager for insuring all public inspection file materials are prepared and posted to the online file in a timely manner. Station personnel have received instruction on political recordkeeping requirements and on the importance of uploading materials to the public file in a timely fashion. The station has implemented those elements of the

compliance plan set out in the Consent Decree, other than the reporting requirements of paragraphs 15(c) and 16.

The station's procedures have also been changed to provide for periodic outside review of station operations, including its public inspection filings, for compliance with FCC requirements. Specifically the licensee has enrolled the station in the Florida Association of Broadcasters' Alternative Inspection Program. The licensee will have the station re-inspected every three years, as contemplated in the program.
