

REASON FOR APPLICATION

The instant application is being filed on behalf of 1TV.Com, Inc., the licensee of FM translator station K240BD, licensed to Ft. McDowell, Arizona, seeking a minor modification of the facility by substituting adjacent channel 241 for Channel 240 on which the translator is now authorized to operate. The filing of this application has been prompted by the fact that the operation of Station KKLD(FM), a C-1 facility licensed to Cottonwood, Arizona, is now providing a signal which almost completely drowns the signal of K240BD within its 60 dbu coverage area. The resulting interference renders the station unlistenable in its primary area.

Attached hereto is the statement of the station's outside consulting engineer attesting to the fact that based on personal inspection and examination of the signal in the relevant area, some 90% of the 60 dbu area was unlistenable. Accordingly, 1TV.Com, Inc. seeks to modify the license of K240BD to specify Channel 241. It is respectfully requested that this application be processed on an expedited basis in order that the station may return to the air with a listenable signal.


Dear Mr. Gates

I, Doug Pelley have been an engineer in the Phoenix market for 30 years. I have many clients in the FM and AM business. The following is my opinion of K240BD Construction permit.

During the process of installing and activating the transmitter and preparing to file the license to cover, it became immediately obvious that the K240BD signal was suffering from interference imitating from co-channel KKLD C1 licensed to Cottonwood, AZ. Upon this realization I immediately decided to drive the entire 60dbu coverage area. Upon completion of driving the signal it was abundantly clear that 90% of the 60dbu was unlistenable. In addition there were many areas wherein all I could hear was KKLD and the in the other areas KKLD was causing other interference, causing the K240BD signal to be obliterated.

In sum, it is my professional opinion that K240BD is displaced. I have recommended to my client that they should move to channel 241.
