CBS Operations Inc. (“CBS”), licensee of translator television station W61AK (TV) (the “Translator”) requests special temporary authority for the continued operation of the Translator pending the Media Bureau’s disposition of a pending petition for reconsideration of the Bureau’s action, by letter of October 15, 2007, canceling the license for the Translator (the “Translator License”) and deleting its call sign. The cancellation of the Translator’s License was due to CBS’s inadvertent failure to request its renewal when it filed its license renewal application for WTOG (File No. BRCT-20041001ALB) (the “WTOG Renewal Application”), the signal of which the translator retransmits.

As explained in the petition for reconsideration, CBS’s failure to file for the translator’s renewal was an oversight, resulting from counsel’s unawareness of the existence of the Translator; this in turn was a consequence of a change in the personnel responsible for WTOG’s license renewal after the integration of the CBS Television and Paramount Television Stations Groups, following the merger of the former CBS Corporation and Viacom Inc. in May 2000.¹

CBS has tendered an amendment to the WTOG License Renewal Application, to request renewal of the Translator’s license, which is pending on CDBS. The translator is currently operating and providing service to the public, retransmitting the programming of WTOG (including CW Network programming) to approximately 7,200 viewers in Citrus County, Florida, who reside in an area beyond the Grade B contour of WTOG. Continuation of this service will clearly serve the public interest.

¹ On December 31, 2005, Viacom Inc. (“Old Viacom”), the ultimate owner of WTOG, effected a corporate reorganization in which its name was changed to CBS Corporation, and certain other businesses owned by Old Viacom were spun off into an independent, publicly traded corporation, which was given the Viacom name (“New Viacom”).
