The Calhoun County 9-1-1 District operates the primary public safety answering point (PSAP) for 9-1-1 telephone calls and emergency communications in Calhoun County, Alabama. Calhoun County 9-1-1 serves the citizens of Calhoun County, Alabama, which encompasses 612.32 square miles and a population of 118,572 (2010 census). On average, the PSAP processes 200 9-1-1 calls per day.

The Low Power FM (LPFM) radio service will further enhance our ability to protect the safety of life, health and property of the community at large. By co-locating the LPFM studio facilities Calhoun County 9-1-1 Communications Center/PSAP, which is already staffed 24-7-365 to process public safety communications, the LPFM service will be able to immediately broadcast information such as:

1. Emergency Alert System (EAS) transmissions;
2. Real-time notification and alerting for the community regarding emergency situations, such as vehicle accidents, severe weather, amber alerts and other public safety incidents;
3. Live traffic information;
4. Alternate travel routes in an effort to ease traffic congestion;
5. Continuous public education and information designed to enhance the community's preparedness for emergency situations.

By leveraging the existing infrastructure associated with a 14-site Project 25 land mobile radio (LMR) system, which Calhoun County 9-1-1 operates for public safety communications, the LPFM radio service(s) will further enhance our mission to protect the safety of life, health and property. Our regional communications system currently provides mission critical two-way communications for nearly 3,100 users in Northeast Alabama, including law enforcement, fire services, emergency medical services, schools, hospitals, etc.
