Juab County, Utah filed for the above listed television channels in the 2009 filing window to serve three small Rural Communities. Presently these towns have no direct digital reception either from a direct primary station or TV translator station. A few people could receive very snowy pictures when the primary stations were on the VHF analog channels but now UHF digital signals simply are non-existent because of the high mountains surrounding these communities on all sides.

Because of the 75-mile exclusion, these applications were filed at the Levan telecommunications site some 82 miles from the coordinates located in Salt Lake City with full intentions of providing this service to these communities. After further testing our intended transmit signals interfered with the incoming digital receive signal thus lending our new channels unusable. This was inadvertently overlooked because there is no FCC database for protection of existing digital receives signals.

Juab County has access to another site that would provide digital signals to these communities, located 67 miles from the Salt Lake City FCC designated coordinates. Our county has the needed funding on hand to build a new small building; new translators and tower at a location that would even better serve these towns.


Therefore, Juab County Requests Temporary Authority to operate these channels within the 75-mile exclusion area located on a developed telecommunications site located only 7 miles within the excluded area.

Susan Hansen has run Longley-Rice programs for us to assure no interference would be generated to any other viewers if these STAs were granted. With the grant of this request, construction would begin immediately thus allowing the site to be completed and operational by late summer. Free-Over-the-Air signals would then provide nine digital channels for these small rural communities, as these towns desire to be included in the broadcast analog to digital television transition.

Time is of the essence as winter construction becomes impossible.

State of Utah TV translator Coordinator R. Kent Parsons has also reviewed this request and supports this needed change
