On November 24, 1998, the Commission granted its consent to transfer the licenses of over 50 stations from the shareholders of Pulitzer Publishing Company to Hearst-Argyle Television, Inc. ("Hearst-Argyle").¹ This transfer was sought in order to effectuate a merger of Pulitzer Broadcasting Company ("Pulitzer") into Hearst-Argyle. Among the stations for which the Commission granted consent to transfer were WYFF, Greenville, South Carolina, and nine of the thirteen television translator stations rebroadcasting the signal of WYFF.

It was the intention of all parties to the 1998 transaction that all of WYFF's television translator stations be transferred to Hearst-Argyle.² However, perhaps due to the fact that the transfer of control application included over three dozen television translator stations, it appears that the four translator stations that are the subject of this application were somehow overlooked by FCC counsel for Hearst-Argyle, who neglected to list them on the filed FCC application. Consequently, four of WYFF's translators have remained licensed as if under the control of Pulitzer, despite the transfer of control of WYFF to Hearst-Argyle and Pulitzer's merger into Hearst-Argyle.³ Subsequent to the merger of Pulitzer and Hearst-Argyle, Pulitzer's name was changed to Hearst-Argyle Properties, Inc.

The relevant agreements for the transfer of WYFF as well as its television translator stations were attached to the applications filed on Form 315 in June 1998. Due to the fact that such agreements are already on file with the Commission and the fact that the agreements were executed over six years ago when the relevant transaction occurred, the agreements are not attached as an Exhibit to this application.
