Request for Special Temporary Authority for Reduced Power Operation

Washington State University (“WSU”), pursuant to Section 73.1560(d) of the FCC’s rules, notifies the FCC of the reduced power operation of noncommercial educational radio Station KNWY(FM), Yakima, Washington and respectfully requests Special Temporary Authority (“STA”) to maintain the reduced power operation for more than thirty (30) days.

WSU is currently operating KNWY(FM) at 64% of its authorized power due to equipment failures. Specifically, the loss of a power supply has forced the station into its current low power operation. The KNWY(FM) power levels have fluctuated due to this technical problem, but WSU believes that the current reduced power operation commenced as of January 18, 2010.

WSU is currently taking steps to repair the KNWY(FM) facility in order to resume full power operation. WSU has already attempted to resolve the problem with a replacement power supply, but experienced a failure with that equipment as well. A new power supply has been ordered from the manufacturer and delivery is expected shortly. WSU respectfully requests STA for a period of three (3) months to allow for continued reduced power operation pending the receipt and installation of the equipment necessary to restore full power status.

A grant of STA will serve the public interest because it will allow WSU to maintain its existing noncommercial educational radio broadcasting over KNWY(FM) for listeners in the station’s community until such time as the necessary equipment repairs can be completed.

WSU is a noncommercial educational licensee and operates KNWY(FM) on a noncommercial educational basis. Moreover, WSU qualifies as a governmental entity. This application is therefore exempt from FCC filing fee requirements pursuant to Section 1.1114 of the Commission’s Rules, and the facility is exempt from FCC regulatory fees, pursuant to Section 1.1162 of the Rules.
