RULE 73.503 ELIGIBILITY STATEMENT

Wasatch Public Media (“WPM”) is a nonprofit corporation organized under the laws of the State of Utah for the purpose of meeting the educational and informational needs of Salt Lake City area residents. In particular, Article III of its Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation provides that the corporation “shall be operated exclusively for educational, charitable, scientific, and literary purposes ...;” and provides that this objective is to be accomplished by, among other things, the broadcast of “news, talks, speeches, lectures, musical concerts, recorded music, plays, theatricals, recitals, programs, revues, readings, [and] reports.” There is no provision in WPM’s Articles or By-Laws which restricts WPM from advancing an educational program or from complying with Commission Rules and policies.

In order to meet its educational purpose, WPM plans to offer a diverse array of noncommercial programming designed to meet the needs of the listening area. That programming will include, for example, a locally-produced talk radio program (“Public Square”) dealing with issues of local concern to citizens in the area. It will include programming from National Public Radio (such as “Morning Edition” and “All Things Considered”), the BBC World Service, and National Geographic (such as “World Talk”), as well as programming such as “Beehive Archive,” which is devoted to vignettes on interesting events in the history of Utah. A copy of WPM’s program schedule is attached.

In fact, WPM is already offering this programming by virtue of an Operating and Programming Agreement entered into with the licensee of KCPW-FM, Community Wireless of Park City, Inc. A copy of this Agreement is attached to the application. Thus, WPM offers not merely program promises, but also educational programming already being aired.

In short, WPM has an educational objective and the station will be used for the broadcast of programming in furtherance of that objective in accordance with Rule 73.503.
