Explanation for Late Filing
of License to Cover

Community Television of Southern California (“CTSC”), licensee of low power television translator Station K67FS,¹ Bakersfield, California and full power noncommercial television Station KCET, Los Angeles, California, requests that the Commission grant CTSC a license to cover the construction permit for a minor modification of Station K67FS. (File No. BMPTT-20050321ANW). That construction permit expired on June 24, 2005 without CTSC filing a license to cover application, although construction had been completed and program tests commenced. For the reasons set forth below, grant of this application will serve the public interest.

Since 1993, CTSC has been operating K67FS to rebroadcast the public television programming aired on KCET to the Bakersfield community. On June 24, 2002, the FCC originally granted CTSC a construction permit to modify its Bakersfield television translator to minimize interference to a full power station. (File No. BPTT-JG0601UI). In March 2005, CTSC filed a minor modification application to change the tower location and antenna. (File No. BMPTT-20050321ANW). The Commission granted that modification on March 25, 2005, but retained the construction permit expiration date of June 25, 2005.

¹ The construction permit gave CTSC the authority to change the translator channel to 46, and thus the call sign to K46II. For ease of reference, CTSC refers to the translator as K67FS.

On June 16, 2005, CTSC timely completed construction of the station and began equipment tests pursuant to Section 73.1610 of the Commission's rules. The following day, June 17, 2005, CTSC began program testing pursuant to Section 73.1620 of the Commission's rules. However, CTSC inadvertently did not notify the Commission of the commencement of program testing and did not timely file a license to cover application.

Upon discovering on July 12, 2005 that these filings had not been made, CTSC filed a notification of program testing with the FCC that same day. In addition, CTSC promptly completed and filed this license to cover application.

For more than a decade, Station K67FS has retransmitted the public television programming of KCET, and without authority to continue operating, the residents of the Bakersfield area will be unable to receive this off-the-air public television programming. Thus, the public interest would be served by granting this application so that CTSC can continue to provide public television service off-the-air to the Bakersfield area.
