FIRE INVESTIGATION TASK FORCE

The Watervliet Fire Investigation Task Force was created in 1991 and is a synergy between the Watervliet Fire Department and Watervliet Police Department. The team is comprised of three Fire Officers and two Police Investigators. All members of the Task Force are certified by the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and are all graduates of the Arson Investigation Academy at Montour Falls, New York. During 1995 there were five arson case investigations and there was one arson arrest. Any inquiries regarding the Fire Investigation Task Force should be forwarded to Fire Chief Brian Carroll.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WATERVLIET FIRE DEPARTMENT

The history of the Watervliet Fire Services dates back to the early 1800's with the formation of volunteer companies. The first recorded fire company was organized in 1828 and was known as the Niagara Engine Company No.1. Throughout the 1800's various Watervliet Fire Department Companies provided service to the community. These Fire Companies include:

FIRE DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

The **Watervliet Fire Department** is the Fire and Emergency Services branch of the City of Watervliet municipal government. The Department consists, currently, of twenty five full time professional firefighters. The Department operates under a four platoon system which provides for six staff members per platoon. The on duty work schedule is a twenty four hour shift.

The first alarm response consists of one engine, a light rescue unit, and an aerial tower manned by platoon members on duty. Greater alarms are responded to by recall of off duty personnel via the Departments page/radio monitoring system and additional mutual aid or special call response. Advanced Emergency Medical certifications are held by all members of the firefighter staff. The EMS program is overseen by a medical doctor (Dr. Dailey) and Capt. Rob Conlon.

The **Table of Organization** for the Fire Department begins with the Mayor as the Chief Elected Officer. He has the responsibility to order or declare a "State of Emergency" as prescribed under New York State and Albany County Disaster Control Programs. The General Manager is the Commissioner of Public Safety and is ultimately responsible for all emergency operations of the Fire and Police Departments. The Fire Chief is the ranking officer and chief administrator of the day to day operations of the Fire Department. Ranking Below the Fire Chief are Captains, Lieutenants and Firefighters. Fire Captains are Shift Commanders of the four Platoons.

The Incident Command System (ICS) is a coordinated effort that brings together the major elements of an operation - specifically, command, operations, planning, and logistics under a unified command. The ICS is the backbone of Emergency Services response in the City of Watervliet.

Watervliet Fire Department provides service to:

- 10,202 residents (population density highest in the Capital District - 7,134 persons per sq. mile)
- 5,052 dwellings units (84% of all dwelling units are pre-1940 construction)
- 3 elementary and secondary schools and numerous commercial and industrial sites in the community

BICYCLE TRAILS

The 4th Street parking area in Watervliet is the northern terminus of the Hudson River Bike Path that runs from Corning Preserve in Albany to Watervliet. This section of the regional bike path system connects with sections through City of Cohoes, along the Mohawk River in the Town of Colonie and westward to the Town of Niskayuna.

PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS

Seventh Street Park: This park is located in the area of Seventh Street and Second Avenue in the Port Schuyler section of the City. Park amenities include a basketball court, swings and playground apparatus, and a Spray Pool that is operated in the summer months week days, Monday through Friday.

Pershing Green: This park area, named after famed General "Black Jack" Pershing, is located in the area of Second Avenue and Fourth Street and has provided a park green space for several generations. Park amenities include a basketball court, swings and playground apparatus.

Reds Field: This playground and park area is located at Eighth Street and Third Ave in the Port Schuyler section of the City. The park amenities include

a baseball/softball field and a basketball court.

Clinton Park: located at Clinton Street and Avenue A, this playground provides basketball courts, swings, and a neighborhood Spray/Wading Pool for younger children that is operated during the summer months.

Brotherhood Park: This park are is the home of the Watervliet Little League. It is located at Twenty Fifth Street and Sixth Avenue and the playground amenities at the facility include basketball courts and a Spray Pool .

The Dome: also known as the Watervliet Veterans Memorial Recreational Facility, is an indoor facility that provides a year round location for recreational activities. The facility is located at Second Avenue and Thirteenth Street.

Some of the recreational activities at the Dome include:

- Capital District Girls High School Basketball League - summer months
- Capital District Boys Junior Varsity League - summer months
- Coach George Mardigan Basketball Camp for Boys and Girls - summer months
- Watervliet Youth Soccer League - fall, winter and spring

Mayor James Cavanaugh Hudson Shores Park: This park area is located along the Hudson River adjacent to I-787 and provides a river walk and fishing opportunities. Park hours are 9:00AM to 9:00PM.

SPECIAL EVENTS

The **Arsenal City Run** is a road race event that began in 1982 and has drawn runners from all area of the region. It is comprised of 5K and 10K race events, as well as a Fun Run for families and children. The 5K event is designated by the USATF Adirondack Association as the annual Championship race competition for both the Men's Open and Master's (over 40 yrs) levels. Information can be obtained by calling the Recreation Department at 518-270-3811.

The City of Watervliet and the Combined Veterans Association of Watervliet sponsor an Annual Memorial Day Parade held on the day of the holiday, Monday. The parade kicks off at 10:00 AM and proceeds from the Watervliet High School parking lot to 19th Street, east to 2nd Avenue, then south to 16th Street and ends at the Veteran Memorial Park, where a memorial service takes place honoring all veterans. Everyone is welcomed. Any person or any group wishing to participate in our annual parade may contact the Parks and

Recreation Department.

The Annual 4th of July Festival runs from 2:00 PM to 10 PM at the Hudson Shores Park, located off the 23rd Street Exit of I787. Enjoy various bands, the wares of a variety of vendors, food and games for all ages. The night ends with a fireworks display from the Hudson River. Shuttle bus service will run throughout the City to transport residents to and from the park, contact the Parks and Recreation Department for times and locations. Vendors are also encouraged to contact the Parks and Recreation Department.

The City of Watervliet sponsors an Annual Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony at 6:00 PM the Friday following Thanksgiving at Veteran's Memorial Park, located at 16th Street and 2nd Avenue. There will be Christmas caroling, refreshments and a souvenir tree ornament given to each family. Santa will be on hand for the children's enjoyment. 



The City of Watervliet Water Supply System was constructed in 1914-1917 to provide an ample, safe, potable water supply to the residents of the City of Watervliet. The components of the water system include: the Dam/Reservoir, the Transmission Line, the Filtration Plant, and the City Distribution System. The Water System is operated in compliance with the the Laws and Regulations as set forth in Part 5 of the New York State Sanitary Code and the Amendments to the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act of 1986.

Water Impoundment/Reservoir

The Watervliet Reservoir is a man-made impoundment located in the Town of Guilderland. In 1916 a 380 foot reinforced concrete slab and buttress dam was constructed in a foundation of solid rock to form a reservoir on the Normanskill Creek at French's Mills. The seven hundred acre reservoir has a capacity of approximately 1.6 billion gallons and a safe yield of approximately 12 MGD. The Normanskill Creek, Bozenkill Creek and the Black Creek are the primary streams that feed the reservoir from a watershed with an area of approximately 110 square miles. There are plans to increase the capacity of the reservoir to 20-25MGD by raising the level of the reservoir. This will provide a safe and reliable pure water source for the entire area.

In 1981 the **Hydroelectric Plant** was constructed at the dam site. A new intake and penstock were constructed and a hydroelectric generating facility was built and, for environmental reasons, buried in the stream bed. The plant produces electricity that pumps water to the City of Watervliet and the excess is sold with revenues benefiting the taxpayer of Watervliet. The pumping station was built originally in 1917 at the site and was refurbished in 1981. This station pumps water from the French's Mills Guilderland plant, through a Transmission Main underground approximately 17 miles, to the Water Filtration Plant located one mile west of the City of Watervliet.

Watervliet Filter Plant

The City of Watervliet Filtration Plant was originally constructed in 1915 with modification and additions made over the years. The hydraulic capacity of the plant is approximately 6 MGD although the current 2005 demand is approximately 3.0 to 3.4 MGD. The plant is a rapid sand filtration type with the conventional surface water filter process of coagulation/flocculation sedimentation and filtration. This is a 1.8 MG clearwell for storage of filtered water. Water flows by gravity from the Filtration Plant to the City Distribution System.

Water Distribution System


The Distribution system provides potable water to all 10,200 residents and commercial locations in the City as well as supplying the Watervliet Arsenal with approximately 300,000 GPD. The system was originally laid out in the early 1900's and has had substantial replacement and maintenance throughout the years. The system is flushed twice a year and appropriate testing and sampling programs monitor all areas of service. The City of Watervliet Charter, Laws and Rule provide that property owners are responsible for maintenance and replacement of water and sewer laterals attached to City Mains from the property to the connection at the main.

























About Watervliet Arsenal

Welcome to Watervliet Arsenal, the nation's oldest and, in many ways, newest, manufacturing arsenal. Founded in 1813 to support the "Second War for Independence," the War of 1812, the arsenal has been a valuable resource ever since. In 1887, the arsenal became America's "Cannon Factory." It is America's sole manufacturing facility for large caliber cannon in volume. (Watervliet is pronounced water-vuh-leet)



Located along the Hudson River, just a few miles north of the state capital at Albany, Watervliet Arsenal continues to produce today's high tech, high powered weaponry. Cannon -- the finest cannon manufactured in the world today -- remains the principal product of Watervliet Arsenal. The guns manufactured at Watervliet Arsenal provide the firepower for the Army's main battlefield tank, the M1A1 Abrams.

From recoilless rifles and mortars to howitzers and tank guns, the arsenal is recognized as the premier cannon maker. While today's cannon appear to be much like the "big guns" of yesterday, they are far more complex and require highly sophisticated technology to manufacture.

The co-location of Watervliet Arsenal and Benet Labs allows for complete lifecycle management from idea through research and engineering, into prototyping and testing and, finally, into full-scale production. All at one site. This offers unique possibilities for timely creativity and production.

A 10-year \$350-million renovation program completed in 1992 has made Watervliet Arsenal one of the most sophisticated, automated heavy manufacturing and machining centers to be found anywhere -- private or public sectors.

This up-to-the-minute technology is not limited to cannon manufacture. Intricate, prismatic machining jobs are handled with ease. One of the most extensive metals processing facilities in the entire northeast is located at Watervliet Arsenal. Now, with federal legislation allowing the arsenal to

participate in commercial contracts, this unique national resource can be shared with the non-government community.



Museum

Are you a military history buff?

Interested in the "Big Guns" -- old artillery pieces such as cannon, guns and howitzers?



If so, the Watervliet Arsenal Museum is a place for you.

The museum tells the story of Watervliet Arsenal as well as the history of the Big Guns. In addition to the many one-of-a-kind guns from the past 400 years, there are many new artillery weapons on display. Everything from 60mm lightweight company mortars to the massive 16-inch guns of World War II battleship fame can be found at this small but significant jewel of a museum.

But before we go on a brief cybertour of the museum, let's look at the reasons the museum exists and the interesting building that houses the museum.

The Watervliet Arsenal Museum tells the story of America's development of cannon as well as the history of America's oldest, continuously active arsenal. The Watervliet Arsenal Museum had its modest beginning in 1968, when a few arsenal managers formed the Arsenal Historical Committee. This small but dedicated group of arsenal history buffs had been putting aside precious artifacts over the years. Due to the hard work of these volunteers, the first display area was opened in 1975. The museum as we know it today was actually established in 1980, when the first curator, Mr. William Bradford, was hired. Mr. Bradford and his staff turned a mass storage area into a professional, properly catalogued museum. After several more years of hard work, the museum qualified under the stringent standards of the Chief of Military History as a Certified Army Museum.

Mr. Bradford retired in 1995 and was succeeded by Ms. Rosemarie Hutchinson. Sadly, after only five years as curator and nearly a dozen years on the museum staff, Ms. Hutchinson passed away in the spring of 2000. She was instrumental in developing the museum's archives and primary source holdings into a first class research facility.

Mr. John Swantek now serves as Museum Curator. Mr. Swantek, who has been Watervliet Arsenal Public Affairs Officer and Historical Officer for 19 years, has been the administrator of the museum for 15 years. In 2002, he completed a master's degree in museum studies at Norwich University. He also holds a bachelor's degree in finance and an MBA from Syracuse University.

The museum is housed in the Iron Building, or as it is mundanely referred to in arsenal records, Bldg. 38. The building is listed on the National Register of Historical Landmarks. It is made entirely of pre-fabricated cast iron plates, cast and wrought iron trusses, and sheet steel roofing. The building was chosen to be the museum site in 1971. It was erected in 1859 under the orders of Major Mordecai, a past arsenal commander. The original purpose of the building was to store ordnance materiel, tooling and equipment. It continued serving that purpose through World War II. It was later converted into a facility for "layaway" storage. The museum, archives, offices and storage occupy the entire 30,000 square feet of the building. As mentioned, the artifacts on display range from special leather goods manufactured at the arsenal to the world-class quality cannon for which Watervliet Arsenal is known. The items tell the fascinating story of the role the arsenal has played in America's defense since 1813. Of course, some of the priceless cannon exhibited are from much earlier times, the 16th century -- and earlier.

There is also a library and research facility. Thousands of historical publications, photographs, and other bits and pieces of military history are on file. People who are interested in learning more about the arsenal should call Mr. Swantek at (518) 266-5805.

But enough background -- let's go on a cyber tour of the Watervliet Arsenal Museum.

As you enter the doors of the historical Iron Building, you begin with a closer look at the design and construction of the building itself. There is also a diorama of the arsenal. You can see where you entered the arsenal and where you are in relationship to the manufacturing or "mission essential" areas and the public sectors of the arsenal.

Your self-guided tour begins to the right. There are some beautiful examples of early 16th and 17th century cannon; highly decorative guns which were the pride of the first cannoners. Next is the truly priceless Burgoyne fieldpiece surrendered at the decisive Battle of Saratoga. There are French artillery weapons, Coehorn mortars, naval guns, etc. You get a glimpse of the cannon-making art in the 1700s. Many other types of ordnance

line the walls here, including a Spanish one-pounder Lantanka gun, a Valliere gun, which is a French cannon; a British medium 12-pounder cannon (1760), a French Gribeauval eight-pounder cannon (1764), a Verbruggan bronze field gun from the 1770s, a 24-pound howitzer (1776), a Gribeauval 24-pound howitzer and 12-pound cannon, and an early U.S. 12-pounder. Before you turn left through the doors into the Civil War period, check out the display on the original Erie Canal which once ran directly through the arsenal. Sections of the original east and west walls of the Erie Canal are evident on the arsenal today.

The Civil War is the topic of the next exhibit hall. As we turn left and continue through the museum, we are surrounded by an impressive display of weaponry and ammunition used during the tragic War Between the States. The first glass case we come upon holds a number of different types of ammunition used during the war, such as strapping shot, shells, powder bags, musket balls, along with the items used to manufacture them. The larger artifacts are displayed against historically accurate backgrounds as they may have been used by the blue and grey. The first item that we come to is the Navy 3.67-inch parrott rifle, which was used on the U.S.S. Honeysuckle in 1865. There is also a 10-inch seacoast mortar, which weighs 5,000 pounds and once propelled 87.5-pound cannonballs 4,250 yards. The cast iron Napoleon 12-pounder howitzer is displayed in the middle of the room along with the Williams automatic cannon, which dates back to 1862. This cannon was called the secret weapon of the Confederacy and saw action during the Battle of the Seven Pines. It had a range of 2,000 yards, and was hand-crafted. Although it was an automatic weapon, it was still not considered to be reliable because of problematic pressure from extensive firing and heat. The largest mortar used during the Civil War was the cast iron seige mortar. The huge artillery piece weighs 17,200 pounds and fired 289-pound cannonballs up to 4,000 yards. The last gun we see in the Civil War section is the U. S. Smith gun. This was an experimental breech loader manufactured at West Point Foundry.

As we round the corner, approaching the Post-Civil War section, we are introduced to interesting items, other than artillery, used and manufactured at the arsenal. Some of the items include the McClellan saddle (1859), stirrups, and hames, which were set in draft harness collars. Among the manufactured items are knapsacks, cartridge boxes, and hunting knives. The period after the Civil War was a lean time for Watervliet Arsenal until officially being named America's cannon factory in 1890. Many different guns and cannon are displayed here that were manufactured at the arsenal. They include a French Debangue breech from the 1870s, a field carriage (1898), an eight-centimeter crucible steel breech-

loading rifled field cannon, and a 3.6-inch breech-loading field mortar (1890). There is also an exhibit of the first 16-inch gun, which was completed in 1902. It measures 49.5 feet long and weighs 624 tons. The Benet family was quite important to the success of the arsenal, so a section in this portion of the museum is dedicated to them. Brigadier General Stephen Vincent Benet was the Chief of Ordnance in 1878, and Colonel James Walker Benet was commander of the arsenal from 1919 - 1921. The cannon breech display shows such artillery as the 105mm howitzer, 155mm Schneider breech, and the Nordenfeldt screen breech. The main section of the museum brings us to more modern types of weaponry. We are introduced to the many and varied types of mortars, aircraft cannon, and recoilless rifles of modern artillery warfare. Among these are the 90mm M67, 105mm M27A1, 75mm M20, 106mm M40A1, and the 155mm M64. There is a small section showing breech parts and muzzle brakes. Muzzle brakes are used to lessen cannon recoil by providing a surface or series of surfaces for the propulsion gases to impact when leaving the gun tube. Next to this is the rifling section. Rifling is a series of spiral grooves cut in the cannon barrel which impart a spin to the projectile along the longitudinal axis, creating gyro action. In the middle of the room, all the modern guns and cannon are displayed. This section includes such artillery as the T95E1 90mm smooth bore cannon, 155mm M185 gun-howitzer, 120mm M256 gun, eight-inch howitzer M2A1, and the 152mm gun launcher XM150E6.


As we approach the curator's office, there is a small display showing different types of nuclear projectiles, such as the M754 for the M753 projectile, the M423 for the M422 projectile, and the M455 for the M454 projectile. World War II is the theme of the next series of guns. First, we have a 37mm antitank gun M1 from 1942. This gun weighs 2700 pounds and once fired ammunition 10,860 yards. Next, there is a 75mm pack howitzer M1A1. This gun's weight is 1,440 pounds and has a range of 9,620 yards. Lastly, we get to study a map showing all the battles of World War II and the dates and locations throughout the world where allied troops engaged the enemy. This completes our cyber tour.

Here we also see a restored belt-driven machine from the classic 19th century period of arsenal production. This is an example of what will be a completely restored full machine shop that will take you back to the 1890s and the beginning of the cannon-making at Watervliet Arsenal.

Now that we've whet your historical appetite, make it a point to come to Watervliet Arsenal and view for yourself all of the history that lies inside the doors of the classic Iron

Building.

The museum staff provides fascinating tours for individuals or groups, small or large. The museum's archives provide an invaluable research resource for historians, authors, geneologists and other students of ordnance production. The Arsenal Museum is free and open to the general public from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday through Thursday. Donations to the Watervliet Arsenal Historical Society are greatly appreciated. The box is just inside the front door.

New deal for Arsenal

WATERVLIET - The U.S. Army has awarded a new five-year contract to the Arsenal Business & Technology Partnership to be the exclusive economic developer for the **Watervliet** Arsenal site, U.S. Rep. Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, said Monday.

"I know the Army is very pleased with the progress at **Watervliet**," McNulty said.

The partnership has brought in 16 new businesses, creating 150 jobs. It has renovated more than 100,000 square feet of office and manufacturing space. More is being renovated.

The Arsenal Partnership is a nonprofit group created in 1999 to redevelop underused space at the arsenal. Companies there work in precision coatings, advanced ceramics, plastics, homeland defense technology, software development, security consulting and clean room construction.

Sweeney touts incubator's strengths
Congressman hopes to secure more funding for Watervliet facility, which he

WATERVLIET - Local economic development officials were at the **Watervliet** Arsenal on Tuesday to show off the **Watervliet** Innovation Center to U.S. Rep. John Sweeney.

Sweeney, a Clifton Park Republican, was responsible for getting funding for the WIC, a 2-year-old business accelerator at the arsenal that helps develop companies interested in selling to the homeland defense market.

The center is home to seven companies. Another eight are affiliates but have their offices at other locations. WIC is run by the Center for Economic Growth, an Albany-based economic development group.

CEG leases about 8,000 square feet of space from the Arsenal Business & Technology Partnership, an economic development group that controls about 220,000 square feet of business space there. About half is occupied; the rest is being renovated.

Sweeney secured a \$450,000 federal grant in 2004 for a feasibility study, and late last year, he secured another \$750,000 for operations at the center.

"He set about doing it, and he did it," said Kelly Lovell, CEG's chief executive. "Today we have an opportunity to say thank you."

Sweeney said he would like to bring additional funding to the WIC, especially since WIC companies are working on homeland defense technologies.

"It's been extremely important, certainly for the economy of this region, but I think it's important for the nation," he said.

Despite the fanfare for the center, Sweeney spent most of his time talking about rising gas prices and energy policy. An impromptu news conference he held afterward focused entirely on the issue, although much of it addressed the fact that the country's energy policy is tied to its national security.

"We need to make some bold moves now," Sweeney said. "The world is a pretty destabilized place, especially where oil is produced."

Tony Gaetano, president of the Arsenal Business & Technology Partnership, said about 1,200 people work at the arsenal. But he hopes that number will rise to 2,000 by the end of the decade as the private sector companies grow. He said many are drawn to working closely with the Department of Defense and with one another. "That's why companies want to be here," Gaetano said. "It's the strongest word of mouth possible. These guys multiply customers for each other."

Arsenal changes leader, mission

WATERVLIET - A 22-year Army veteran will take command of the **Watervliet** Arsenal on Friday, marking the first leadership change since the announcement of a public-private partnership aimed at turning the 192-year-old cannon factory into an incubator for defense technology innovations.

Col. Kevin R. Moore will take control of the sprawling military facility a little more than two months after it was spared the ax in the Pentagon's latest round of military base closures.

Moore replaces retiring Col. Donald C. Olson, who served three years rather than the standard two in order to make **Watervliet** his last post, arsenal spokesman John Swantek said Monday.

Moore, a 45-year-old Wisconsin native, takes the position as the arsenal's mission evolves. In addition to being the country's only large-scale producer of large-caliber cannons, the arsenal is embarking on a plan to provide some of its space and resources to startup companies that focus on developing military technologies.

Since 1999, the facility has been renting space to private firms, but the year-old **Watervliet** Innovation Center specifically focuses on homeland defense technologies.

"Like in any job, any executive position, it's going to change every year," Swantek said. "Dealing with commercial tenants and partnerships and all that is certainly going to be different."

But the arsenal's core mission will remain much the same, he said. "The job of making those guns, whether business is slow or business is booming, is pretty much the same job," he said. "It is being manager of a manufacturing plant. The commander still is responsible for the quality of the cannon that leaves the arsenal." The arsenal, according to its Web page, produces the guns carried by the Army's primary battlefield tank, the M1 Abrams.

Moore, who enlisted in the Wisconsin Army National Guard in 1979, has held many positions, including commander of the Maryland-based 16th Ordnance Battalion and commander of a combat equipment battalion at Camp Doha in Kuwait.

He will officially take command from Olson at a closed ceremony on Friday morning. Olson's initials will be stamped on the breech of the last gun manufactured under his tenure, and Moore's will be stamped on the first of his command.

Swantek said the tradition is meant to underscore the personal responsibility of the commander for the quality of the weapons produced under his command.

Moore, who could not be reached for comment late Monday, is the latest in a line of more than 50 commanders since the arsenal opened in 1813 to help arm the country against the British in the War of 1812.

Olson joined the arsenal in 2002. On his first day, he stressed that flexibility and innovation would be crucial to the facility.
