Details: CELL TOWER CONSULTATION PROCEDURES In the interests of streamlining the Section 106 National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) consultation process for proposed cell phone tower sites, the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma has developed the following procedures. Please review these procedures and share them with others at your firm who will be contacting us. Beginning November 3, 2010 we are requiring a fax, mailing or shipping of materials to our tribal office regarding cell tower consultation. We will not handle any cell tower consultation electronically.

1. If your response from the FCC (through the TCNS or otherwise) lists the Peoria Tribe of Indians of

Oklahoma the Tribe is interested in consulting. As we have already defined our geographical areas of concern with the FCC, as is clearly noted on the TCNS web site, the FCC's response to you should list the Peoria Tribe only for those areas we have pre-defined.

When you receive the FCC response that lists the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma for your area, you have been officially notified of our interest.

2. Please always use the TCNS number the FCC supplies you in any type of communication with us. We do not begin our research until we have the TCNS number. If you send us supplemental information at a later date, be sure to include the TCNS number on it, as well. Handwriting the TCNS number on your correspondence will be fine. Lack of a TCNS number on supplemental information will delay our response.

3. We do not wish to consult on co-locations that do not involve ground disturbance. We do wish to consult on co-locations that involve ground disturbance. If, after researching and spending some time on a project we then determine it is a co-location without ground disturbance, we will not refund the research fee. When we respond directly through the TCNS on tower sites, we cannot always determine that a tower will be a co-location with no additional ground disturbance. If you receive an e-mail from us through the TCNS on a tower that is a co-location without ground disturbance, you may simply fax us back and let us know, and we will close the file on that project. Please do not e-mail a response.

4. To initiate consultation with the Peoria Tribe please submit a brief project summary via U.S. mail or other

carrier, together with a per-tower fee of \$100.00 to cover our research for the project location as well as general handling and processing of the documents you submit. Please note, this fee is NOT for determining our initial interest, as we have already done so by defining our geographic areas of interest through the TCNS, but for providing specialized information unique to the Peoria Tribe.

5. With the consultation initiation letter, please include the following:

a. Contact information, including phone and fax numbers, physical address, and e-mail address for the person (please specify by name) to whom information from the Peoria Tribe should be sent (this information should be included in the letter). If you do not include your fax number, it will delay our response. Please always give the phone number where we may reach you.

b. A copy of the review letter from the State Historic Preservation Office for the state

in which the tower is located. If (and only if) a separate Office of State Archaeology exists in the state that reviews and clears project separately from the SHPO (as in Oklahoma), then also send a letter from that office. The Peoria Tribe may request the SHPO (and Office of Archaeology, if applicable) letter before providing final comment on the project.

c. These portions of the archaeological report: research methods and findings for both the historic archives review and the field survey, plus a description of the project area's geomorphology and soils. The Peoria Tribe will request these parts of the archaeological report before commenting on the project. If you are not certain what to send from the archaeological report, please call and we will reach a mutual agreement about what sections we would like to see. Please do not send us the architectural survey information, unless it is embedded with the archaeological information. Only on rare occasions are we interested in standing architecture. We would appreciate 2 or 3 pictures of the project area.

d. A copy of the portion of the USGS quadrangle map, on which you have noted the project area location by a star or similar mark; please list the quadrangle name and date on the map (8.5x11 size is fine). Please do not send us multiple types of maps or engineering/construction drawings, or numerous photos.

e. Please fax or mail/ship us materials regarding cell tower consultation. We will not handle ANY cell tower consultation electronically. Fax(918-540-2538) or mail/ship information; you may also call us at 918-540-2535 with questions. We will not typically respond to requests received via e-mail.

6. PLEASE DO NOT SEND: the entire Form 620 and its attachments; various engineering or construction drawings; many different maps; resumes of archaeologists or historians; numerous photos of the location or of historical architecture (2-3 photos are appreciated). Please send only the items listed in item 5, above.

7. Please use only the following address and contact information. The business office is closed on weekends and holidays. Express Mail for overnight delivery by the U.S. Postal Service may be a good choice with delivery to our PO Box on Saturdays and some holidays. Please note the two different zip codes below.

17. THPO Kim Jumper - Shawnee Tribe - Miami, OK - regular mail

Details: THIS IS YOUR OFFICIAL NOTICE THAT THE SHAWNEE TRIBE IS INTERESTED IN CONSULTING ON ALL PROJECTS BUILT IN OUR AREAS OF GEOGRAPHIC INTEREST.

ATTENTION, NEW INFORMATION: Our procedures were updated on 14 January 2008. Please call Kim Jumper, THPO, at 918-542-2441, so that she can send you a copy.

If your tower is a co-location, please fax us this information to let us know. We cannot always tell from the TCNS web site that a tower is a co-location. We require a written response from you to let us know that it is a co-location. If a co-location project includes some new ground disturbance (such as from an expanded compound or access road, or construction of an ancillary structure), the Shawnee Tribe treats such a project the same as any other non co-location project.

Our correct mailing/physical address is: 29 South Highway 69A. Our correct phone number is (918-542-2441) and our historic preservation fax line is (918-542-9915). THPO Kim Jumper manages all cell tower consultation.

As of 26 June 2006, all of the faxed responses of our final comments on a tower site will contain an original Shawnee Tribe signature. Each final comment fax is signed individually. Copies may be compared, for authentication, against the original in our files. If a final comment fax does not contain a signature, it is not valid. ALL FINAL COMMENTS FROM THE SHAWNEE TRIBE ARE WRITTEN; FINAL COMMENTS ARE NEVER PROVIDED VERBALLY. IF THE SHAWNEE TRIBE IS CREDITED WITH HAVING GIVEN A VERBAL RESPONSE, THAT RESPONSE IS NOT VALID.

If you receive notification through the TCNS listing the Shawnee Tribe, that is an indication that the Shawnee Tribe is interested in consulting on the tower for which that notification was received. Please consider that our official indication of interest to you. The Shawnee Tribe considers the Tower Construction Notification System's weekly e-mail to be the first notification that we receive that a tower will be constructed in an area of our concern. We do not view the TCNS notification as completion of 106 consultation obligations.

The Shawnee Tribe has developed streamlined consultation procedures for cell tower developers and their subcontractors. If you do not have a copy of the procedures - most recently updated on 14 January 2008 - please contact us, as you must follow these procedures to consult with us on cell tower projects. Call us at 918-542-2441 or fax us at 918-542-9915. It is the tower builder's responsibility to make sure that you have our most recent consultation procedures.

Details: If you are receiving this notice, your proposed site may fall within the Menominee ancestral territory.

For the State of Michigan, however, the Menominee Tribe only needs to review proposed constructions that lie 50 miles inland from the East side of Lake Michigan.

For all proposed projects, please E-MAIL a state map with the proposed site marked with an 'x' to David Grignon, Tribal Historic Preservation Officer, Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, at: dgrignon@mitw.org. It is very important that the map is sent to the Tribe ELECTRONICALLY. Additionally, the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin requires all applicants/tower builders to provide the Tribe with an archaeological survey whenever there will be ground disturbing activity associated with the proposed project. Please E-MAIL the results of the archaeological survey to: David Grignon, THPO, at: dgrignon@mitw.org. An archaeological survey is not required if the proposed construction is a collocation on an existing tower, or located on a rooftop or water tower, or on ground that has been previously disturbed to two feet or below. For proposed sites in the State of Illinois, the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin is only interested in areas north of the Illinois River (including Chicago).

The information you provided was also forwarded to the additional Tribes and NHOs listed below. These Tribes and NHOs have NOT set their geographic preferences on TCNS, and therefore they are currently receiving tower notifications for the entire United States. For these Tribes and NHOs, you are required to use reasonable and good faith efforts to determine if

the Tribe or NHO may attach religious and cultural significance to historic properties that may be affected by its proposed undertaking. Such efforts may include, but are not limited to, seeking information from the relevant SHPO or THPO, Indian Tribes, state agencies, the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs, or, where applicable, any federal agency with land holdings within the state (NPA, Section IV.B). If after such reasonable and good faith efforts, you determine that a Tribe or NHO may attach religious and cultural significance to historic properties in the area and the Tribe or NHO does not respond to TCNS notification within a reasonable time, you should make a reasonable effort to follow up, and must seek guidance from the Commission in the event of continued non-response or in the event of a procedural or substantive disagreement. If you determine that the Tribe or NHO is unlikely to attach religious and cultural significance to historic properties within the area, you do not need to take further action unless the Tribe or NHO indicates an interest in the proposed construction or other evidence of potential interest comes to your attention.

Areas of Potential Effect

AREAS OF POTENTIAL EFFECT

APE for Direct Effects

The APE for direct effects is the construction site for the proposed broadcast tower facility, where such construction would result in ground disturbance and dislocation of soil. This area of potential direct effects, determined by an examination of plan maps provided by New Life Media, consists of the 65' x 22' (19.8 x 6.7 m) tower compound area, the proposed 15' x 165' (4.6 x 50.3 m) access easement, and a proposed 5' x 120' (1.5 x 36.6 m) long utility easement.

APE for Visual Effects

The APE for visual effects is the geographic area in which the proposed undertaking has the potential to introduce visual elements that would diminish or alter the setting of any historic property where integrity of setting is a character-defining feature of such property that, in part, makes it eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (National Register). Specifically, this geographic area is the extent to which the proposed broadcast tower would be visible, and if so, would have the potential to introduce visual elements that would alter or diminish the integrity of any historic property's relationship to surrounding features and open space, therefore compromising the ability of such property to convey its historic significance.

In accordance with the Nationwide Programmatic Agreement of March 2005, a one-half mile (.8 km) APE for visual effects is applicable to this 125' (38.1 m) tall broadcast tower (See Figure 4 and Figure 5).

**Identification of Historic Properties
& Assessment of Direct Effects**

IDENTIFICATION OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES & ASSESSMENT OF DIRECT EFFECTS

A review of records held by the Illinois State Museum indicated that no previously recorded archaeological sites are located within the immediate vicinity of the APE for direct effects. In addition, no previous cultural resource surveys have been conducted within one-half mile of the proposed undertaking.

Archaeological fieldwork, performed primarily to determine the presence of previously unrecorded historic resources within the APE for direct effects, was conducted under the direction of Virginia Janssen on November 22, 2010. The project area consists of a fallow agricultural field located at the top of a small rise.

Both surface inspection and the excavation of subsurface tests were used to investigate the potential for unrecorded historic resources within the APE for direct effects (Figure 3). A single pedestrian transect was used to investigate each of the two proposed easements. Three pedestrian transects, spaced approximately 4 m apart, were utilized to investigate exposed surfaces within the tower compound area. A representative view of the ground surface exposure within the APE for direct effects is presented in Photograph 8.

Ten 30 x 30 cm subsurface tests were used to examine the APE for direct effects. Soils from these tests were dry-screened through 6 mm hardware cloth. Three shovel tests, spaced approximately 7 m apart were used to examine the tower compound area. Four shovel tests, spaced approximately 12 m apart, were used to examine the proposed access drive. Finally, three shovel tests, also spaced approximately 12 m apart, were used to examine the proposed utility easement. The same soil profile was encountered in all ten shovel tests exhibiting 0-20 cm of yellowish brown (Munsell 10YR 5/4) silty clay loam over 30 cm of brown (7.5YR 5/3) silty clay.

No archaeological features were noted on the surface, and no cultural material indicative of an archaeological site was recovered from the subsurface shovel tests. Therefore, it is the opinion of the principal investigator that no NRHP-eligible archeological site will be affected by this undertaking.

Nevertheless, it should be noted that ground disturbing activity should be halted when it is reasonable to believe that an archaeological site has been encountered which will be affected by this undertaking, and that the State Historic Preservation Office be notified of these finds. Also, if human burials or human remains are encountered during ground disturbance, it is imperative that local law enforcement, as well as the district medical examiner and the State Historic Preservation Office, is notified prior to resuming work.

Identification of Historic Properties & Assessment of Visual Effects

IDENTIFICATION OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES & ASSESSMENT OF VISUAL EFFECTS

According to a review of records held by the Illinois State Museum, and a review of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency's online Historic Architecture and Archaeological Resources Geographic Information System (HAARGIS) indicates no previously documented historic properties are located within the one-half mile APE for visual effects. Likewise, a review of the online National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) listings indicate no NRHP-listed resources are located within the one-half mile visual APE. In addition, no historic properties have been identified through comments of Indian Tribes, local governments, or members of the public.
