The Village of Solvay was established in the year 1894. It has an approximate size of 1.6 square miles. It is located east of Camillus, south of Onondaga Lake, and west of Syracuse. The main routes of travel are US-5, NY-690, and Milton Ave., which is the main shopping street in Solvay. The development of Solvay took the whole industrial strip across the Town of Geddes, and the residential area south of Geddes. After the turn of the century, Solvay was an exciting place to live, and grew very fast. This was due to the people involved in building the Solvay Process Company. The Solvay Bank, built in 1917, helped to develop the west end. Through the years, Milton Ave has been modernized many times, and you can still find all the warmth and personal service that makes Solvay what it is today.



Stormwater Management Plan Annual Meeting Scheduled

The annual meeting to present the 2004-05 Stormwater Management Plan Annual Report has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 24th at 6:30Pm at Village Hall. [A copy of the draft annual report is available here.](#)

New Stormwater Regulations Mean Some Changes for the Village and our Residents

The 1987 Clean Water Act (CWA) contained provisions aimed at launching a national effort to regulate the discharges of pollutants into waterways during runoff events. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published Phase I regulations in 1990 which focused on large and medium-sized municipalities and stormwater runoff from certain specified types of activities. As a result, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), given permitting authority by the EPA, issued two general permits in 1993. The first dealt with industrial site runoff and the second with stormwater runoff from construction activities disturbing an area of five acres or more.

EPA's Phase II stormwater regulations were promulgated in 1999, significantly expanding the scope of activities subject to permitting. March 10, 2003 was set as the date which new and ongoing Phase II construction activities would need to obtain a permit. The threshold for construction activities was reduced to one acre or more of disturbed area. More of interest to the Village, however, was the fact that the Phase II regulations also identified publicly owned and/or operated separate storm sewer systems (MS4s) which were located within areas designated as urbanized as defined by the United States Census as also needing a permit. The Village of Solvay was identified as an MS4.

What does this mean? Under the MS4 permit, by March 2008, the Village must adopt a Stormwater Management Program which addresses six minimum measures:

1. Public Education & Outreach on Stormwater Impacts - Includes

developing an ongoing program to educate citizens about the impacts of stormwater discharges on local water resources. Includes printed material such as brochures and press releases as well as electronic access to stormwater information via the Internet.

2. Public Involvement & Participation - Includes identifying key stakeholders and individuals interested in providing input in support of meeting MS4 requirements and goals. Residents also have full access to the Village's Stormwater Management Plan as well as the opportunity to attend the annual public meeting and have their comments incorporated into the annual report.

3. Illicit Discharge Detection & Elimination - Includes a wide variety of administrative (codes, ordinances, local laws, etc.) and maintenance (dye testing, system inspections, etc.) activities to address harmful discharges to the stormwater system.

4. Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Control - Includes a wide variety of administrative activities from site plan review to code enforcement inspections at construction sites.

5. Post-Construction Stormwater Management - Includes regulating post-construction runoff through some form of regulatory mechanism, identifying appropriate management practices which should be implemented as permanent stormwater facilities and developing an inspection and maintenance program.

6. Pollution Prevention & Good Housekeeping - Includes preventing pollutant discharges to the stormwater system from municipal operations, adopting recognized management practices and conducting employee pollution prevention training.

You now have an opportunity to memorialize a personal, family, or business connection to this important manufacturing site by purchasing a personalized brick to be inlaid in the park walkway.



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



Preservation & Expansion Campaign

In anticipation of the **Solvay Public Library's 100th Anniversary** in 2005, the Library Board of Trustees began the process of addressing the needs of the facility in 2000. This Library is one of three in the county originally funded with construction seed money from Andrew Carnegie and the only one in the county still in public use. The Library serves the Town of Geddes and Village of Solvay and houses Solvay Process Company archives (www.clrc.org/solvay). It is a member of the Onondaga County Public Library System. The grand Greek revival, yellow brick and oak paneled building, likened to the Acropolis, requires patrons to climb ten steps to enter.

The goal of the Library's Centennial Building Project is to **preserve the building for future generations and to renovate it** so that it may remain a public use building as well as meet the changing demands of the community. When originally designed in 1903, the steep stairs leading to the main entrance gave the Library an impressive, stately appearance. Throughout the years, however, the steep stairs proved to be a barrier, making the Library inaccessible to the handicapped and disabled. Seniors and parents with young children find entry to the building difficult, too.

In 1920, the Solvay Public Library had 9,539 holdings and circulated 24,420 books and magazines. In 2004, the Library had 26,074 holdings and circulated 113,261 items, now including DVD's, books-on-tape, music CD's, and videotapes. Growth of the collection and addition of media materials and computers has made the library space cramped and inefficient. Library holdings have increased 48% in the past 20 years and circulation has increased 100%, from 49,352 to 98,716. The electrical system is terribly overloaded. Library staff has virtually no space to organize their work and store supplies. Poor drainage around the building has threatened the historic landmark's foundation with hydrostatic pressure and has resulted in years of water seepage and interior flooding. With a cooperative Village Board and centennial anniversary, the Library Board of Trustees determined that **the time had come to address the building's problems**.

The Solvay Public Library was cited as one of the key institutions in the Village of Solvay's Vision Committee survey. Located across the street from the Solvay Elementary School, the Library rests at the crossroads of the Village. A Centro bus stop is on this corner. The Library is walking distance from the Solvay High School and the Solvay Youth Center. Preschoolers at Learn as You Grow daycare walk to the Library every Friday during fair weather for storyhour in the Community Room. Concerts and performances are held on the Library front lawn. The Library also provides tutoring space for Literacy Volunteers, delivery of BOCES education material, and bulk loans of large print material to Solvay Senior Apartments. Recent Ukrainian immigrants take advantage of tutoring space, Ukrainian books, ESL materials, Internet access, job opportunities, and local educational and job market information. Community groups such as Girl Scouts, the Solvay Red Hat Club, a book discussion group, and the Piercefield Women's Club regularly meet in the Community Room, as well as, training workshops for the local daycare center and Kidspace. Since 1987, the Solvay Public Library has held the archives (www.clrc.org/solvay) of the Solvay Process Company (Allied Chemical – Honeywell), which left the village in 1986.

Project Plan

PHASE 1 (completed): To address the structural preservation issues, new drainage around the building will draw the water away from the foundation. While the property was disrupted, a new parking lot was created on the east side of the building for direct entrance into the Community Room and overflow parking for the main lot. Sanitary

lines were repaired, new water lines run, utility conduits laid, new sidewalks installed, and new outdoor lighting placed. Construction costs remained within budget.

PHASE 2: An addition with *an elevator and new entrances will be built to make the building handicapped accessible*. The addition will also include (1) new reading areas, (2) expanded area for storyhour and the children's collection, (3) new and expanded circulation desk, (4) small meeting room, (5) new bathrooms, (6) new stairwell, (7) new computer lab, (8) records storage and staff work areas that do not exist at all now, and (9) a new environmentally controlled room for the Solvay Process Collection and local history. Per NY State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) requirements, the grand Woods Road entrance will remain unchanged as an emergency exit. The addition will allow the oak paneled reading rooms to remain the same, including the working fireplaces. The children's collection and program space will be moved to the lower level to take advantage of the Community Room, back patio, and ease of entrance. Furnishings will include shelving, tables, chairs, and oak cabinetry salvaged from the local Hazard School, recently demolished. The improved facility will allow greater participation in "non-traditional" library services, currently the fastest growing library programs. A **Building Committee** of volunteers and staff experienced with construction meet regularly to review plans, resolve issues, and push the project forward.

PHASE 3: The old and new building will be tied together with updated electrical work in the old part of the building, landscape finishing, HVAC updates, etc.



In addition to the author's donated work to produce the book, the costs of production of this volume were covered by a significant donation from [Solvay Paperboard](#) and a generous donation from [Geddes Federal Savings](#). The result is that the book sales will directly benefit Solvay Public Library.

A release signing of the book was held at the Library on November 4, where Solvay Paperboard's General Manager, Tom Stigers, received thanks from the Friends of Solvay Library. "We are proud to have been able to support the production of this book and the Library," he said. "As a newer part of the history of this Village, we are happy to contribute in this way to our community."

Copies of Solvay Stories III are available at Solvay Public Library for a donation of \$20 each to the Library. "This book has the potential of raising a considerable amount for the benefit of Solvay Public Library," Cara Burton, Library Director said. "From the first printing alone – and new contributions from Judith LaManna Rivette from the other Solvay Stories book sales – we are anticipating just under \$40,000 to benefit the Library. We are looking forward to brisk Christmas gift-giving sales."

Sales from the November 4 signing seem to support these predictions. "We were overwhelmed," Burton commented. "Just from that one afternoon, donations to the Library were over \$1,000."

Solvay Stories III contains photos of the Village of Solvay dating from the late 1800s through the present time. It travels down Milton Avenue, includes images of Solvay Process, taverns and stores, and then through the Village, to its fire houses, and to Westvale and back. The photos create their own memories, recalling pieces of the former and of the present and, as always, that special spirit and community of the Village of Solvay.

The Solvay Public Library is a municipal public library of the Village of Solvay, New York. It is governed by a seven member Board of Trustees. The library is also supported by the Town of Geddes. The Carnegie Foundation and Frederick Hazard helped the community of Solvay fund the building, built in 1905. In 2002, the library began a plan to enlarge the library and parking lot, and to provide handicap accessibility. The library is home to the Solvay Process Collection, an historic collection of photographs, technical documents, and other archival materials donated by Allied Chemical Corporation. Solvay Process Company, formed in 1881, was a major manufacturer in the Solvay community.

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SOLVAY PUBLIC LIBRARY TODAY

Today, the Solvay Public Library continues in its tradition of being a center of the community and in playing an important role in its development. The library affords the community opportunities for cultural, artistic and educational activities for the children and adults of the area it serves.

In 2002, the Solvay Public Library began a Centennial Building project to address handicap accessibility, lack of space, and drainage problems. With support from a community fund drive, local, state, corporate and private giving, the Trustees hope to have a larger parking lot, addition, and elevator by the library's 100th birthday in 2005.

The Solvay Public Library is one of 20 independent libraries that are members of the Onondaga County Public Library system. Also part of the system are the Central County Library and eight Syracuse branch libraries. Library card holders can borrow materials from any library in the system and return them to any library. The Solvay Public Library contains over 30,000 books and 75 periodical subscriptions searchable on the [Onondaga County Public Library online card catalog](#).

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HISTORY OF THE SOLVAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Solvay Literary Club was organized on October 15, 1900, to operate a Reading Room located in Guild Hall. Although Guild Hall was owned by the Solvay Process Company, the Reading Room was open to all residents of Solvay and the area. Sometime later, the Reading Room became the Union Free School District #2 Library with O. Ware Clary as head librarian. Guild Hall's Reading Room collection was combined with the high school collection to form the new Solvay Public Library's collection of 2,042 books on opening day.

On January 14, 1903, as a result of correspondence between Lamont Stilwell, attorney for the Village of Solvay and Andrew Carnegie, Mr. Carnegie offered the village a gift of \$10,000 to build a library. The village agreed to contribute \$1,000 per year to operate the library and to provide a suitable site for the building. Two sites were offered to the village; Frederick Hazard's offer of the corner lot on Woods and Orchard Roads was chosen over Mrs. Lucy Gere's Hall Avenue and Williams Street corner lot. Further, the Solvay Process Company agreed to match Mr. Carnegie's gift of \$10,000 and to provide \$500 per year for maintenance and support of the new library.

The Board of Trustees of the Solvay Public Library first met on April 13, 1903. Its first members were Frederick Hazard, George J. Schattle and Charles D. Richards. The Solvay Public Library was granted a charter by the New York State Board of Regents on May 21, 1903.

Architect James A. Randall of Syracuse was employed to design the new library building. He presented his final plans and specifications on October 1, 1902. The initial estimated cost was about \$20,000; but when the building opened September 5, 1905, construction cost totaled \$27,568.25. The Solvay Process Company and Mr. Hazard contributed a total of \$17,568.25 toward the construction fund in addition to donating the site.

At its October 26, 1904 meeting, the library board appointed O. Ware Clary as Librarian, Cornelia Mertens as Assistant Librarian and Gilbert Saxby, janitor. Upon Clary's retirement in 1911, Miss Mertens became the Librarian and her father, Jacques, became the Assistant Librarian. A portrait of the Mertens still hangs in the library.

The Solvay Public Library operated a branch library in the Boyd Avenue School Building from 1915 to 1928. Additional collections were placed at the Lakeland, Prospect, Fairmount and Taunton Schools; the Geddes Town Hall and the Pass and Seymour factory. By 1916, a regular weekly story hour was being conducted.

Over the years, many community groups have met at the library. Around 1913 the Village Improvement Society and the Boy Scouts met at the library and the Syracuse YWCA conducted Bible Classes for teenagers in the library. During World War I the community room was converted into a club for the soldiers camped at the State Fair Grounds. Mr. Mertens also gave French lessons to the soldiers.


In the 1930's, the Solvay Garden Club was organized at the library. In 1947, Mrs. James Cooper organized a social club for teens which met on Saturday nights. In later years, the Home Bureau, the Girl Scouts and Cooperative Extension also met at the library.

On January 1, 1962, the library became a member of the Onondaga Library System. It became a member of the Onondaga County Public Library system when the system was formed in 1974. Using combined federal and locally raised funds of over \$243,000, the Solvay Public Library was completely renovated in 1979. Renovations included a new heating-air conditioning system, new lighting and wall-to-wall carpeting.

Two years later, the library catalog and circulation was automated. Through the Onondaga County Public Library, Solvay Public Library can secure virtually any book in the United States. In 1986, the [Solvay Process Room](#) was created to house the Solvay Process Collection donated by Allied Chemical Corporation.

In 1991, the Community Room at the library was renamed the Daniel W. Casey Community Room, in recognition of Mr. Casey's many years of dedicated service to the community as a Trustee of the Solvay Public Library. In 2001, the Solvay Centennial Committee donated a cast iron historical marker recognizing the library as a local landmark.

Through the generosity of the Allied Chemical Foundation and descendants of the Hazard family, the Solvay Public Library established the Solvay Process Room. This collection, which first opened to the public December 7, 1986, contains many of the historic papers relating to the Hazard family and the Solvay Process Company, along with historic materials relating to the Village of Solvay and local history books. Frederick R. Hazard's portrait and Solvay Process photographs are also on display in the protective, climate-controlled environment.

In 1990, Solvay Public Library applied for and received grants from New York State and the Rosamond Gifford Charitable Corporation to continue the preservation work on some of these materials through microfilming. The work was completed in 1992.

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































SOLVAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

CENTENNIAL BUILDING PROJECT

The Solvay Public Library, established in 1903, is a municipal library serving the Village of Solvay and the Town of Geddes. Located next to the elementary school, the library is within walking distance for many village residents and is close to a Centro bus stop. To best serve its patrons, the library is a member of the Onondaga County Public Library System, participating in its interlibrary loan and cooperative services.

As a key educational center in the community, the Solvay Public Library interacts with the Solvay Union Free Schools, BOCES, the Solvay Youth Center, and the Town of Geddes Recreation Department. The library also provides special loans to the Solvay Senior Apartments. The library is well used, with overall circulation up over 6% last year and 11.5% the prior year. Circulation per Holdings was up 13.6% last year and circulation per capita was up 17.2%. Computer Circulation has increased the most dramatically, and through October is up 45.6% over 2001's total usage. In addition to the traditional holdings of the Library, it also houses the Solvay Process Collection, archives of Solvay Process Company (Allied Chemical), which left Solvay in 1986.

For decades the Solvay Public Library has served as a cultural and social center for the Village of Solvay and the Town of Geddes. A variety of events take place on Library grounds each year, and the grand historic landmark is one of the most recognizable buildings in the community.

In anticipation of the Library's 100th Anniversary, the Library Board of Trustees has begun the process of expanding and renovating the building that houses the library. One of the primary objectives of the project is to update the library facility so that it can remain a public use building. The Solvay Public Library is housed in one of three Carnegie libraries in the county and is the only one that remains a public use building. The grand, Greek revival yellow brick building requires one to climb ten steps to enter, making the building inaccessible to the handicapped and

disabled. It is also difficult to access for parents with very young children. Parking is woefully inadequate. The growth of the collection and the addition of media materials and computers has made the library space cramped and inefficient. Library Staff has virtually no space to organize their work and store supplies. Poor drainage around the building is threatening this historic landmark's foundation with hydrostatic pressure and resulted in years of water seepage and interior flooding. The trustees aim to resolve these problems by 2005, the building's 100th anniversary.

At a recent meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the preparation of final plans for Phase 1 of the project and anticipates going to bid in January on the site-work and parking expansion. Phase 1 work is expected to commence in the spring.

In 2003, planning for Phase 2 & 3 will intensify and implementation of Phase 2 will commence. In Phase 2 we will add to the rear/south of the building, creating a new entrance facing Orchard Road. The grand Woods Road entrance will remain unchanged as an emergency exit. The addition will allow the oak paneled reading rooms to remain the same with their fireplaces. The new space will house a larger circulation desk, staff workspaces, new bathrooms beside the new entrance, less steep stairs to the lower level, display areas, and some new collection space. Our plan will make all public areas handicapped accessible. The lower level will have more space for programs, meeting room, collection space, technology areas, new utilities and storage. These improved facilities will allow greater participation in "non-traditional" library activities, currently some of the fastest growing library programs. And finally, in Phase 3, renovations will update the HVAC and tie the new area to the old. The steep stairwell will house a new elevator, improving accessibility. It is our goal to complete this work prior to the Centennial celebration for the building in 2005.

Once completed, the Centennial Building Project will allow all county library patrons physical access to this building. The community will continue to be able to enjoy this grand historical landmark as a municipal building. The library will be able to provide more programs, more meeting spaces, and more efficient service to the increasing number of patrons. More and better displays will promote the collection. Staff can better distribute information to the community because of the more efficient layout, circulation desk visibility and location, and organized workspace. Materials and furniture on the lower level will be protected from water damage. Adequate parking will be available for the increasing number of patrons. Parking and space solutions will enable the library to provide more programs to more people, particularly seniors, the disabled and mothers with infants.

Preserving this Carnegie library extends beyond the scope of library services. The building represents the history of the Village as it was created in the hey-day of

corporate wealth and immigrant settlement. Today it stands as one of the few grand village landmarks still remaining. It represents how the combined wealth of residents can provide for a community center for learning and the freedom of access to information we relish in this country. The Solvay Public Library is worthy of your support.

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


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From The Chapter:

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

Any population center has its stories, but it's surprising that **Solvay**, a **village** of 6,500 residents (and an untold numbers of cats), has generated enough for three books. Furthermore, **Solvay** Stories author Judith La Manna Rivette has plans for a fourth tome about the **village** abutting Syracuse's West Side.

" **Solvay** people just have tons of stories," Rivette said, "and I'm surprised I haven't gotten more. I hope more people will tell me theirs with me release of this third book. People want to read about each other and talk about their lives in **Solvay** ."

While the first and second **Solvay** Stories books were all prose, this third, re-released last November, weaves its yarns in photographs. Rivette is donating all the proceeds from the book's sale to the **Solvay** Public Library; **Solvay** Paperboard and Geddes Federal Savings donated funds to cover the costs of production. "My heart is in the **Solvay** Library," she said, "dial's where I grew up reading. It is going through a renovation, which started about the same time the first book came out, and I'd like to help with that. People, when they buy something, like knowing it's going to a good cause."

Copies of **Solvay** Stories III are available at the library, 615 Woods Road, **Solvay**, for \$20. It is also for sale at Borders Books and Musk in Carousel Center and on-line at www.ohhowupstate.com. "This book has the potential of raising a considerable amount for the benefit of **Solvay** Public Library," said its director, Cara Burton. "From the first printing alone-and new contributions from Judith from the other **Solvay** Stories book sales-we are anticipating just under \$40,000 to benefit the library."

When the library held a book signing on Nov. 4, nearly 500 copies were sold. "We were overwhelmed," Burton added. "Just from that one afternoon, donations to the library were over \$1,000."

The book contains photos of the **village**-from the **Solvay** Public Library as well as **village** residents-dating from the late 19th century through today. Traveling down Milton Avenue, it includes images of **Solvay** Press, taverns, stores and firehouses.

This is the sixth book written by Rivette, who by day works as a labor arbitrator. In addition to the three **Solvay** Stories is her first novel, Chasing Hillary (2006), and two State Fair-related books, about **Solvay's** pride, the New York State Fair. "I did Two Kids at the Fair because, while I was selling State Fair Stories at the fair in 2006, I realized there was nothing kids could walk away with that wasn't a toy," said Rivette, who illustrated the book with the help of her then 5-year-old grand-nephew, Justyn La Manna. "It's still selling pretty well; it's an activity book."

Rivette will be available to sign all six of her books during the grand opening of the new wing of the **Solvay** Public Library on Sunday, Feb. 3, at 2 p.m. For more information, call the library at 468-2441.

ASCIOTI'S KEEPS ON GRINDING

DICK CASE POST-STANDARD COLUMNIST

Marc Ascioti really throws himself into his work. "It's good exercise," he says with a big grin.

We're in Ascioti's Meat Market, on Milton Avenue, in the heart of the **village** of **Solvay**. The store was opened 94 years ago on this very spot by Marc's grandparents, Antonio Ascioti and his wife, Catherine.

Marc's making the store's illustrious meatball mix, a product that's traveled the world, literally. He sometimes mixes it three times a day. Christmas week, the stuff flies out of the store. "I'm at the grinder eight hours," Marc explains. "It's a mob scene."

The recipe's Catherine's, Marc's grandmother, who also cut meat in the store. According to the "meatball story" told by Frances Quattrone, his aunt, the mix came about in the 1960s at the request of nuns at St. Cecilia Church.

It includes ground chuck beef, cheese, water, salt and pepper, parsley, garlic, Italian bread and eggs in proportions that are still a family secret. Marc starts by grinding 150 pounds of chuck; then he churns in everything by hand. The stuff on the table in front of him he calls "the fluff." It's everything in the blend and smells heavenly.

The senior Asciotis - from southern Italy, by way of Philadelphia - planted the family flag in **Solvay** in 1914, across Milton Avenue from the Iroquois Pottery plant (now a China Towne store) because Grandfather Antonio was told "**Solvay** needed a good meat market." His brother had a place at the other end of Milton briefly.

The store hasn't changed that much over time. It's dominated by the long meat cooler, loaves of Di Lauro's bread along on the top and stacks of mostly shop-made

goodies inside, including Marc's sausage of all kinds and a line of Polish food from Hapanowicz Bros. Meat Market in New York Mills, the legendary home of kielbasa.

"Everything's special here," according to Joe Cavallo, the market manager who's been at Ascioti's 30 years and loves the work. Joe once had a Silver Star market in **Solvay**. "I always eat good," he tells me.

This is a thoroughly family business: small, cozy and prosperous. My hostess for the visits was Frances Quattrone, the founders' daughter who is retired as principal of **Solvay** Elementary School and lives above the store with two sisters, Fanny and Jesse. Fanny inherited title to the store from her parents.

Catherine and Antonio had 10 children, six still living, and all were involved in keeping Ascioti's humming across the years. "If we need help, we call the cousins," Frances says. She works at a small table with a calculator at the front of the shop, checking out customers who exit with packages wrapped in white paper under their arms.

The meatball mix definitely is the best-seller, Frances says. During my stopover, one regular, Joe Anderson, of Jamesville, left with \$69 worth of mix, headed for Binghamton, where he planned to drop off portions for the personal lunches of hospital workers on his regular route. "They fell in love with the product," he says.

Another customer I had to swear not to name picked up her regular mix order, saying, "My husband thinks I make the meatballs myself." Like other clients, she rolls the mix into balls and freezes it for future use.

"Here comes another meatballer," Joe Cavallo says as Nancy Zanoni enters the store for a mix order, which Joe scoops out of the brimming tray provided by Marc Ascioti. Nancy says she's been a customer "more than 20 years."

Marc shows me the business card of Robert VanHorne, another regular who walked out with 40 pounds of mix packed in dry ice and headed for Thailand.

Peter Vilasi, Marc's uncle, managed the store most of his life. He showed Marc how to mix the meatball recipe. Marissa, Marc's daughter, sometimes helps out at the store, also.

Judith LaManna, a **Solvay** native, mentioned Ascioti's in her book, "**Solvay** Stories II," in a story about Pete (Vilasi) the Butcher:

"He used to cheerfully sing out to me, 'What can I get for you today, Dolly?' I thought it was a special name for me but learned he used the same line with other girls. For adults asking for meat, he had a different line; he would look up, wipe his thick hands on his blood-stained apron and reply, 'I'll get that for you, my friend.'"

Frances Quattrone says she enjoys checking out orders and keeping the books at Ascioti's, "because I love being with people."

No, she says, the store's just the right size: "I don't think we need to expand," she explains. "I think we'll stop selling cigarettes when the stock we have is gone, but things are fine the way they are."

The store buys most of its meat from Oneonta Beef in East Syracuse, a longtime arrangement, according to manager Joe Cavallo, who says he moved to the store after Pete Vilasi promised, "I have a nice job for you."

He's an old-school meat cutter. "Most of the meat comes into stores these days all boxed up," he says. "Today, the handlers don't know how to break down a side of beef the way we used to."

That said, Joe dived into cutting 100 pounds of stew meat for Coleman's Authentic Irish Pub.
