Programming on KUEL will continue as it has been with less emphasis on religious programming and more on community programs. We will continue to broadcast Sunday Church services and Northwood Kensett school band concerts. We also broadcast Christmas concerts by Luther College of Decorah, Iowa and concerts by the Mason City Symphony Orchestra. We will be adding more sports broadcasts from events of the two school districts we cover, Northwood-Kensett, and Central Springs as we have been asked to do this by people in the community. We are in a very rural area and our high school sports teams travel at times several hundred miles to compete. The people of the community have donated to the station to broadcast the events as in many cases the distance is prohibitive. In addition to local emergency information and news, we carry some non commercial news and programs from the Salem Radio Network. We program various music segments also with programs ranging from Country and Western to Big Band and Standards, to Golden Oldies, polkas and Classical. We are planning a program which will give some of the high school students a chance to do a music program of their own and learn some of the aspects of radio and how it relates to public speaking. We will also add additional programming involving the school districts and local news as we have only a weekly newspaper in the county and we are the only daily source of information. Eliminating some of the religious programming will allow us more air time to serve the public needs.

Since KUEL is a non profit operation and not supported by advertising and popularity, we are free to do what most commercial stations cannot, spend much of our broadcast day serving the community. A few years ago, we had a major blizzard in North Iowa. At least 100 vehicles, automobiles and semi trucks were stranded on Interstate 35. KUEL's transmitter is located about 1 mile from Interstate 35. Since most of the people stranded on the highway were stuck in their vehicles for over a day, they had lost battery power in their cell phones so local law enforcement made a point of telling callers to keep their auto radios on KUEL and we would provide updates. We operated the station live for 30 hours keeping the stranded motorists advised with information provided to us by law enforcement until plows were able to free clear the highway and free the motorists. We received several messages from stranded motorists about 20 miles up and down the highway in the following weeks thanking us for getting them through a very trying experience by keeping them company and informed as to food, fuel, rescue and so on.

This is one of the programming ,spur of the moment decisions we can make and will do whenever necessary.
